HIGHLIGHTS

- Expanded our Food Pantry hours to 7
 days a week, 1 pm 7 pm thanks to our
 renewed partnership with the North
 Texas Food Bank.
- Opened our Training Center which includes classroom space and a computer lab to offer educational courses to our residents and the public. Made possible by grants from the Clara Blackford Smith & W. Aubrey Smith Charitable Foundation, Regensburger and Munson Foundations, and Ruiz Foods.
- Renovated the shelter kitchen with funding from the Lowe's Hometowns grant program. We increased our capacity to provide nutritious meals to our residents and food boxes to those in need in our community.
- Received a playground makeover
 thanks to the 2024 Leadership
 Denison class and a grant from the
 Oliver Dewey Mayor Foundation. This
 provided the children in residence (30%
 at any given time) a fun and safe way
 to burn off energy and stress.



CHALLENGES

Homelessness in Grayson County/Texoma is on the rise while funding is decreasing.

- Federal grant funding previously directed to
- homelessness relief in our area has been rerouted to the border.
- Rapid growth in Grayson County and a decrease in low Income/affordable housing has fueled an exponential rise in the homeless population.
- Point In Time Count homeless in Grayson Cty:
 53 in 2023 and 456 in 2024.


